Octavia Estel Butler was an American writer who was famous due to his writing on science and fiction. He won the Hugo and Nobel Prizes. In 1995, he became the first author of science fiction to receive the "Genius" Scholarship from the Mac Orth Foundation. His first novel "Master in 1976" will eventually become one of the four-volume Paternity series episodes. Butler wrote several novels, such as Dear in 1979, Parable of Saver in 1993, and Public Relative Council in 1998.
