

National Association Of Hispanic American Case Study

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Discrimination Claims and the Hispanic Officers' Class Action

Members of the National Association of Hispanic American officers and lawyers who have represented them in the past four years announced the class action solution at the Federal Court for a total of 26.8 million. US Records against New York Police Department, former Mayor Rudolph W. Giuliani and former Police Commissioner Howard Safir. The case, filed in September 1999, said the police department had created a hostile environment for minority officers who were disciplined in a discriminatory manner and were persecuted when they complained. According to the resolution that they agreed on during the mediation session, the appointment of special masters appointed by the court, including the 27-month period, during which the court will have jurisdiction over the case to ensure compliance to eliminate the Discrimination and retaliation. The settlement was reported yesterday in the New York Daily News and will be official if approved by the tribunal, probably within a few months, said lawyers from both sides. "We have long struggled to recognize the longstanding issues of discrimination and retaliation in the New York police department," said Anthony Miranda, executive director of the National Association of Hispanic Officers. "First N.Y.U.P. It can effectively combat discrimination in our community; they must first face internal discrimination. "Miranda, a veteran of the 21-year-old police department, retired as a lieutenant, called the settlement a significant victory for the plaintiffs and a positive step for the department and the city. Georgia Pestana, the city's lawyer, said the city would not allow any violation of its regulations. "Any organization with more than 40,000 people will have problems," – he said. "I do not think there is much NYPD in a similar group," Pestana said the city decided to resolve a lawsuit because it would be expensive to discuss why the police department was better off in the past. Under the Regulation, officials and other police department employees who are African-American or Hispanic and discriminated between 1996 and 2003 will be entitled to compensation. Miranda said he expects prices to go from \$ 3,500. For those who have experienced a hostile work environment of up to \$ 400,000.

Workplace Harassment, Retaliation, and Legal Negotiation

Lawyer Richard A. Levy said within 45 days a particular notice would be sent to each minority worker who worked for the 1996-2003 police department. According to him, these notifications will receive instructions on how to claim damages. Special teacher, who sets and determines who is entitled to compensation and sets the amount each will receive, said Mr. Levy.

The case was set to go to court in the United States District Court in Manhattan on January 7, but intensive negotiations began about five weeks ago, Mr. Levy said. The previous mediation attempt lasted about four months in 2001, but it did not go anywhere, he said. One of the special masters who presided over the settlement was Kenneth R. Feinberg, administrator of the Compensation Fund for the Federal Victims established after the September 11 terrorist attacks. Mr. Levy and Mr. Miranda are examples of discrimination allegedly involved in the case.

Some officials reported being harassed with racial epithets or stricter punishments for violations at work than those provided for white officers. Other cases of alleged discrimination were considered most deliberately punitive. Levy said that, for example, Hira Montserrat, a member of Queens City Council who once served in the police, was the first public announcement of the cause in 1999, at the same time an officer. The next day, she tells Levi that Mr. Montserrat was transferred from 111th Queens to the Harlem area near the house.

Institutional Reform and Equal Opportunity in Law Enforcement

Under the deal, equal opportunities for the Office of the Police Department will be a special unit that will analyze whether discrimination or retaliation against minority employees. Officers will be allowed a period to collect data relevant to their case if they claim that the disciplinary rates are discriminatory and must be authorized to pursue the disciplinary process while the office is investigating.
