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Roles of Vocational and Registered Nurses

Nurses take care of patients and help doctors diagnose medical conditions and treat patients. Compensation for Vocational Nurses

For the performance of their duties, the licensed vocational nurse averaged US \$ 42,040 per year, or US \$ 20.21 per hour, as of May 2011, according to the BLS. Payments ranged from under US \$ 30,650 annually to over US \$ 57,080. Almost 30 per cent of nurses work in nursing care facilities, where they obtain an annual average of US \$ 43,090. However, the highest salary was in the granting of subsidies and services, with an average of US \$ 47,930 per year.

Compensation for Registered Nurses

Registered nurses can earn more than US \$ 96,630 per year or US \$ 46.46 per hour or less than US \$ 44,970 annually or US \$ 21.62 per hour. However, his average salary was US \$ 69,110 annually. More than half worked in general in medical and surgical hospitals to earn an average salary of US \$ 69,810 per year. The highest salaries were earned in personal care services, with an average of an annual US \$ 85,940.
