The technologist becomes part of a patient's journey toward diagnosis and treatment. I wanted to become the kind of professional who could offer that same reassurance to others.

My Personal Motivation

I have always had a strong desire to help people. I currently work as a manager at a golf club, where I interact with people from many different backgrounds, cultures, and age groups. This experience has helped me develop communication skills, patience, confidence, and the ability to remain calm while assisting others. Even small acts of kindness, such as explaining each step, listening to concerns, or offering reassurance, can make a major difference.

I am also drawn to this profession because it requires teamwork. MRI technologists work with radiologists, nurses, physicians, and other healthcare professionals. They must communicate clearly, follow instructions carefully, and make sure that images are accurate and useful for diagnosis.
